

The 2023 State of the City Address was presented on Wednesday, July 19th, to a large crowd of citizens. The presentation was well received. Thank you to all the Sky Valleyians who attended. This Power Point Presentation will be posted on the Sky Valley City Website for future review.

Councilman Oliver presented the Mayoral Advisory Committee projects during the State of the City Address. He described the continuing discussions of possible sewer services in the valley area of our city by utilizing an updated engineering study and our GEFA \$3,000,000 grant. Bill's talking points were:

The City has engaged an Engineering Management Study to

- Update costs on previous studies
- Recommend less costly options
- Assist with permitting
- Scalable for future needs

Updated discussions with Harrison Merrill

- Future residential development
- Scalable sewer system as needed

The Planning and Zoning Commission is continuing the process to approve an ordinance to address our Short-Term Rentals to include utilizing an internet Short Term Rental Management Company. The final draft upon approval from the P&Z Commission will be presented to the Council for approval. Our contracted Auditor has asked the State of Georgia for an extension to complete our city's 2022 financial audit. We are hopeful the audit reports will be completed to present at our August Council Meeting,

Our City Manager is currently asking for bids to build a third Pickle Ball court.

Did you know that thirty-three billion tons of concrete are used each year, making it by far the most abundant human-made material in history?

It's the second-most consumed substance on Earth, behind only water. Of course, to make concrete you need cement. And that means we now require around 4 billion tons of cement every year – over a billion tons more than the food we eat annually. This gives us an idea why the cost of concrete is so expensive. Remember, a permit is required any time your project requires poured concrete. For retaining walls greater than 4 ft. from the bottom of the footing to the top of the wall there is a \$100.00 permit fee. For other poured concrete the permit fee is \$50.00.

Sky Valley Property Owners Association Resident Watch Program

The Sky Valley Property Owners Association offers a Watch Program to provide security and health care protection **for all residents**. The program involves giving a property owner the ability to give a key for access to the property to a trusted loved one or neighbor to enter the residence in cases of lack of contact with the public. The Sky Valley Police cannot enter a dwelling without permission from owners. Owners must fill out the form included which allows granted permission to emergency personnel (police, emergency medical personnel) for entry to check on property owners. The forms are to be turned in to the city communications specialist in order for a spreadsheet to be produced and forwarded to the police by digital methodology. The spreadsheet will include the property owners names, addresses, home phone numbers, cell numbers, and key holder names and home and cell numbers. The ONLY data transmitted to the police will be this spreadsheet.

This is open for ALL residents of Sky Valley, NOT just POA members.



NEW DRUGS FOR ALZHEIMER'S ENCOURAGING

Two drugs have been FDA approved by their advisory committee (the FDA still has to give final approval) for AD.

The FDA Advisory committee unanimously approved lecanemab (Leqembi) paving the way

for the traditional approval of the new drug after phase 3 of clinical trials, the last phase, is reviewed by the board of directors. The IV infusion of this drug targets amyloid beta, a protein that abnormally infiltrates parts of the brain in AD (the other protein is tau, which form tangles around brain cells). This drug slows the cognitive decline in AD. The multicenter double blind study (by the drug company Eisai, Inc.) of 1795 patients who had mild cognitive dementia with AD. There was a 27% decrease in cognitive decline as measured by testing 14 tasks. 37% of functioning was better in the group that received the drug, compared to the placebo group. It was estimated to delay cognitive decline by an average of 5 months giving them more time to live independently, enjoy more activities, hobbies, and interests. It will still require follow up studies for safety and continued effectiveness of the drug.

A DRUG FOR CONTROL OF AGITATION AND HALLUCINATIONS

Brexpiprazole (Rexulti), a drug on the market for failures in those with depression, who need a second drug, primarily to control agitation and hallucinations. Now the FDA has approved it officially for those with AD who deal with agitation. Dizziness and lightheadedness is a concern as a side effect, and therefore, getting up from the bed or a chair will need to be careful.

THE NEXT COVID-19 VACCINE BOOSTER-COMPONENTS?

The next booster should be composed of the more recent Omicron variant solely—XBB.1.5, according to the FDA advisory panel, which will be available this fall. All 21 members of the panel recommended not to include the original Wuhan strains in the vaccine we faced early in the pandemic. This makes the booster a monovalent vaccine and distinctly different than the ones available.

The current vaccine is losing its efficacy against the strains today causing illness, which accounts for **95%** of COVID cases worldwide. This vaccine will be available from Pfizer, Moderna, and Novavax, all who have targeted XBB.1.5, which is responsible for **40%** of the current cases.

There are 2 newer strains XBB.1.16 and 2.3, which represent **25%** of the new cases, but the FDA panel doesn't intend to include them.

The current bivalent booster has been very unpopular (only **16%** of the population) and is turning out to be less effective than hoped. This booster creates an activation of immunity from the B cell lymphocytes, but it should be remembered that T- cell immunity will continue to be active, so we have some protection from COVID regardless of the variant. Also, herd immunity is another protective factor.

Recipe



WHOLE GRAINED BREAD

"One of those tasty treats recipes that are often passed down generationally or shared within communities"

INGREDIENTS

- 1 cup cultured milk
- 1,5 cups whole grained oatmeal
- 0,5 cups keto flour
- 1,5 tea spoon baking powder
- 1,5 tea spoon salt
- garlic, black pepper, Italian seasoning – at your preference
- 1 egg

METHOD

- In a large bowl mix cultured milk and baking powder – very quickly
- 2. Make oatmeal flour in a coffee grinder (coarse type)
- 3. In another large bowl mix oatmeal flour and keto flour, salt and seasoning
- 4. Pour cultured milk to flour and mix it with a spoon, add 1 beaten egg, stir well and leave it for 20 minutes
- Form round bread, use aluminum foil for baking
- 6. Bake it for 40 minutes at 425°

Animals in North Georgia

Since moving to Sky Valley, we have seen a wide variety of animals species. Among these are American black bears, deer, bobcats, foxes, turkey, raccoons, squirrels, chipmunks, snakes, trout, and fireflies. But that's just the start of North Georgia wildlife! Whether you're hiking in the national forest, enjoying coffee on your deck, or birdwatching, keep an eye out for these rare and amazing creatures.



Appalachian cottontails are solitary creatures. They are active around dusk or at dawn. During the day they typically avoid predators by sheltering under logs or in burrows. These rabbits don't hibernate, being active year-round. They have about 100 million scent receptors in their noses.

When **Northern pine snakes** are active, they are usually found on the ground but occasionally climb into low trees or bushes. These snakes eat rodents, other small mammals, birds, and bird eggs. Pine snakes are non-venomous and reach sexual maturity at about 3 years old and will then breed once per year.



Eastern Tiger Salamander populations are small, and several are in decline because of pesticide use and ecological succession. These salamanders can live 14 years or more. They are not venomous, but their skin is poisonous. If you happen to come into contact with a salamander, wash your hands and avoid rubbing your eyes or touching your mouth to prevent irritation.





The **bog turtle** is one of the smallest living turtles. You may think you've found a baby turtle, but adult bog turtles only grow up to about 4 inches! Male bog turtles have larger tails than females, and the underside of the shell is concave.

North Georgia is rich in natural beauty and has diverse ecosystems. The area boasts a unique array of wildlife, shaped by distinct geographical features and climatic conditions. So happy that we can explore our new area.

Snake Safety

Less than one-third of the 2,700 species of snakes are classified as poisonous and fewer than 300 species of snakes may be fatal to humans


- Avoid being bitten
 - Leave snakes alone. Most bites occur when people get too close or try to touch or kill a snake.
- Don't tread or step into places outdoors that you can't see.
- Never touch a snake, even if you think it is dead.
- Wearing boots and long pants when hiking may prevent snakebites. Stay out
 of tall grass unless you wear thick leather boots, and remain on hiking paths as
 much as possible

If you get bitten

- ✓ Call 911 or go to the closest emergency department if you are unsure about the type of snake that bit you
- ✓ Stay calm and cool. Minimize activity if possible. However, if you are alone in the wilderness or far from access to medical care, you may have to hike out to the nearest phone/cell phone signal or roadway for help
- ✓ Don't do anything to the place you were bitten—you might make it worse
- ✓ Avoid further injury by staying away from the snake
- ✓ Keep the bite below the level of the heart

Do NOT

- Do not try to suck the venom out with your mouth or suction device. That might lead to an infection.
- × Do not apply a constriction band or tourniquet with a belt or rope as that will cut off the circulation.
- × Do not drink any alcohol or take aspirin after a snakebite. Both thin your blood, which is also what the snake venom does. Do not apply either hot or cold packs
