Code Enforcement



The first day of Fall was Sunday, September 22nd . A time to celebrate harvest and nature's bounty, Fall colors, football, family gatherings and warm fires. This year an unprecedented event occurred. That being Hurricane Helene. Our prayers are with all those affected.

Do you know what this is? You might want to familiarize yourself as it could possibly save you and your property time and a lot of money.

This is an example of a Pressure Reducing Valve (PRV). In homes, PRVs are installed to control the pressure of the water coming from municipal lines, protecting household appliances and reducing the risk of leaks.



Sometimes they are installed near your water meter. Other installations are possibly in your basement or crawl space. You should identify the location of yours. A pressurereducing valve (PRV) is a self-operating valve that is used to reduce any excess pressure in a system. The basic function of PRV is to reduce higher pressure into lower. They are commonly used in homes, particularly in the mountains where pressure can vary depending upon your elevation.

As many of you have experienced, the water system in Sky Valley was installed 50 years or more ago. With variable city water pressure, a PRV can provide valuable protection for your home.

Some of you have found out the hard way by having a poor functioning or outdated PRV that didn't do it's job and when there was a serious spike in water pressure, you may have experienced burst pipes and other consequences including damaged water heaters, etc. If you believe yours is 10 years or older, you might consider replacing it.

Pressure REDUCING Valves maintain almost constant pressure at the downstream side of the valve. So, this valve is used only to maintain or reduce the higher pressure. Whereas Pressure-RELIEF Valves (such as on your water heater) are used to protect equipment and systems from high pressure when the system or equipment pressure exceeds the set limit.

Pressure REDUCING Valves operate continuously in the line whereas Pressure-Relief Valves pop up only when the set pressure limit is exceeded.

The Public Works Department has also worked on pothole patching along with contracting Precision paving to overlay Ridgepole Drive.

As all of you know we were hit with Hurricane Helene, and with the damage, it caused several trees to fall. Our guys worked diligently before the storm to have signs and barricades placed accordingly. They also worked countless hours during and after the storm to clear roads from the debris.

The Public works Department would like to thank all that had a hand in the clearing of our roads. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the people affected by this storm. As we move into fall, we look forward to the annual fall fest. With that comes planning, decorations, and painting of each hay bale. We would like to say thank you to all the ladies that decorate the intersections, they look great.

Water Department

The Public Works Department has fixed quite a few small leaks over the last couple of months. We have also had several major main line breaks. The city is aging and we are working on getting a better plan together to repair/replace these issues over the next several years.

Many of you know that when we have to turn the water off to repair the main lines there is a boil water advisory to follow. This is a mandatory requirement from the GaEPD (environmental protection division). The advisory normally lasts 24-48 hrs due to sampling times. We immediately draw a sample from the nearest site following a main line break and ship to the lab. The city really appreciates your patience through this process.

As always we would like to thank the Mayor, Council, city staff, and all of the people of Sky Valley for their continued support.

Police Department



From the Desk of Interim Chief David Edwards

We would like to welcome everyone to our city.

Please make sure you use extra caution while driving, the increase in visitor vehicles on our narrow roads continues to grow.

The speed limits are posted at 25mph, please be observant of them. Keep in mind that from the timeshare office to past the post office is a 15 MPH zone. We continue to receive resident requests to slow vehicles down on our city streets.

There are also several road and residential projects currently underway. We have increased our efforts in slowing traffic but are bound by the 25/15 mph limits. There have been complaints regarding parking vehicles on the sides of the roads. Efforts are being taken by the city to address this issue.

Remember school is back in session so be alert for children near the roadways and for school busses loading and unloading. Also be aware that, as of July 1st, 2024, Addie's Law, O.C.G.A 40-6-163, is in effect. Addie's Law set new standards for school bus safety such as not having bus stops where children would have to cross the roadway when the speed limit is 40 MPH or above.



The biggest change in the law is the punishment for any violations. Under the new standards, the MINIMUM fine for passing a stopped school bus is now \$1000 and may include up to 12 months in jail. One recent violator thought that once he stopped he could then proceed on his way just as he could with any other stop sign. This is not the case. The best practice is if you're not sure whether you need to stop or not, STOP. Always err on the side of caution!


EMBRACING AUTUMN: ESSENTIAL SAFETY TIPS FOR ADULTS

As the leaves begin to fall and the scent of pumpkin spice fills the air, it's clear that autumn has arrived. Dressing for Weather Changes: The temperature can be unpredictable during the fall, especially in Northern Georgia. Mornings can be chilly, while afternoons can be warmer!

So, dressing in layers is key this season. Lightweight, warm clothing that can be easily added or removed allows for flexibility and comfort. Don't forget to bring a sweater! **Home Safety:** Did you know that the majority of accidents occur at home? It's essential to ensure living spaces are well-lit and free of tripping hazards.

Also, because we're all starting to use our heaters on chilly mornings and cold nights, be sure your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide alarms are functioning correctly. It's so important as we start spending more time inside this fall and throughout the winter season.



Mental Health: Did you know daylight saving time ends at 2 am on Sunday, Nov. 5, with clocks moving back one hour?

Those shorter days and longer nights can lead to feelings of isolation or sadness, a condition known as Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD). Mental health is just as important as physical safety, and they are often interconnected.

Here ares a few tips to help with SAD this autumn:

• Stay connected with loved ones, whether through phone calls, texts, video chats or in-person visits.

Enjoy the fall harvests by incorporating some colorful fruits and vegetables into your diet, and don't forget to stay hydrated!




